During the next few articles, some of the writings of Eddie Coffee will be shown. Eddie came to Taft in 1920 and died several years ago. He was a great source of knowledge about Taft and the area. For many years he served as the elected constable for our area of the county.

These article are from an unpublished typewritten account of his memories as one who grew up and was educated in the Taft schools and lived here as an adult until his death.

I had interviewed Eddie for one of my "Taft Heritage" program. Later on I also interviewed Mrs. Tomerlin, his 8th grade teacher at Lincoln School in 1923. Toward the end of my interview, Eddie walked in and sat down next to his former teacher, and she recognized him. It was an interesting way to bring in one of her former students.

Mrs. Tomerlin's husband taught at Taft Union High School and Taft Junior College at the time. He was the teacher who suggested that Taft's football field by named after Marion Martin who was killed in the bus accident outside of Santa Maria as the team was riding back to Taft on the school bus after a game when the accident occurred -- a car running into the left side of the bus, killing the Taft High student body president who was seated in the front row seat behind the driver.

When the Tomerlin's left the teaching profession they started at the time the world famous and beautiful Bakersfield Inn located on Union Avenue – the first to have been given the name as a "Motel."

Boom Days during the 1920's (continued)

Cost per month for food, lodging and clean linens ran about \$30.00.

Every night Center Street was like a carnival and everyone came to town. Wednesdays and Saturday nights were the busiest. These were the nights of the big dance at Buchanan's Dance Hall located at the (North West) corner of 6th and Main Streets.

The barber shops were full on these dance nights. Every man got a shave, a haircut and shoe shine. Some bought shampoo tonic and, once in a while, a bonmasello (mud pack).

At one time or another my father had a barber shop in six different locations. One on Wood Street had two bath tubs. You could get a used bar of soap and a clean towel of 25 cents.

A shine was 15 cents, but if you didn't leave a nickel of a dime tip you didn't get much of a shine the next time you came in.

On Center Street, between 4th and 5th Streets, there were four large pool halls, the B and B, Shamrock, Oak and Rex. Each pool hall had card games.

ENTERTAINMENT

In the same block, there were 6 houses of ill repute. The Luxor, Sparber, Bachelor, Oxford, Gem, and Krekler. Also, in other locations in town there were two more, the Gray Hotel and Taft Heights Hotel.

In each location there was a landlady (Madam) and four to six (prostitutes). Once in awhile, if the girls got too busy, the landladies would work a little until they took up the slack. During the boom days the price was \$3.00 for a quickie or, if they really wanted a party, you could stay all night for 20 bucks. When the depression hit, the quickie dropped to \$2.00 and you could bargain for the all-night fee.

Most popular landladies in those days were Suzie Rinker, Flo Baker, Kitty Mills and a German gal names Edna (nobody knew her name.)

At the annual dinner which was a very nice affair, Mile Turner, Class of 1956, of Kelseyville, California, gave the opening prayer. When I was able to talk with him he told me of his great friendship while going through school with Robert Barrett now of Antiqua. Turner told me that he and Bob were going to buy and older Buick and drive to South America.

Another pleasant surprise was when Carol (Clark) and Shirley (Cummins) Vierra of Visalia come up and introduced themselves. That was very nice of them to do that. Both are on my list of recipients of my Taft Newsletter. Carol's father was the administrator of Rec District for many years. Shirley's father, Iver, who trained and taught many to play tennis had the Taft High tennis courts named after him. Many was the time that the Iver and his wife and I would visit Pat and JoAnne Mills here in Taft. What was always amazing was to hear Iver recite poetry, some of the poetry it seemed like would go on for more than fifteen minutes. What a memory that man had.
